

Highlands Community Services

Fiscal Year 2023 has been the year where we've learned how to adjust to new definitions of "normal". As an organization, HCS has continued to demonstrate its ability to flex and adapt to ever-changing circumstances and expectations. We have mastered new ways of connecting with our consumers, supporting our staff, and collaborating with our community partners for the collective good. While we have had challenges opening some of our new services planned for FY'23, we have had resounding success with others we've been able to launch. Despite substantial vacancies across most programs throughout this year, our amazing staff have continued to step in and fill voids to sustain service provision and prioritize the needs of those we serve.

In recognition of their relentless commitment to high quality care aimed toward improving the lives of individuals in our community, HCS continues to invest in staff with every opportunity. Including a 5% cost of living adjustment to round out FY'23 and kick-start FY'24, all staff received cost of living adjustments totaling 13% across the last three fiscal years. Throughout this year, we have been fortunate to make additional incremental bonuses and adjustments to salaries for most staff across the agency. Earmarking new funding for this purpose, most staff received additional increases for market equity and most positions saw an increase in base starting salary to help us remain competitive in a challenging workforce climate.

Closing out this fiscal year, we continue to brainstorm the challenges while taking time to celebrate our victories. Continuing to foster solid community partnerships, ensuring we remain on solid financial footing, and continuing to support our community and our staff all land in the "win" column. The success of FY'23 certainly provides a solid foundation for FY'24.

It remains my honor to work for and with this organization, these amazing staff, and our community.

HCS continues to invest in staff with every opportunity.

responder pool across the last fiscal year, resulting in lowered regional demand for HCS staff. This has allowed the focus to shift to the role of clinical oversight and coordination of debriefing response services, which our Department Director of Crisis Services fulfills for the Southwest Virginia EMS Council. We've also been able to prioritize HCS staff to primarily respond to incidents impacting the first responder organizations within our catchment area. Additionally, this fiscal year saw the launch of a specialized trauma therapy tract for first responders with an HCS Lead Outpatient Therapist. Offering a streamlined referral process, the initial year of this service achieved remarkable outcomes.
